The fix? Mentally dress up your man like James Bond and imagine him ravishing you on the hood of his Bentley. It may be surprisingly effective.

Rule #2 Act the part

Why wait for the show to start when you've got a perfectly good male lead waiting in the wings? "Think about what you'd do with the celeb you're hot for and do that with your partner," says

Michelle Callahan, Ph.D., a psychologist in New York City. Invite your guy to a hot-spot restaurant, then stay at a swank hotel and abuse the high-thread-count sheets exactly the way you'd want to with, say, Clive Owen. That said... "People get caught up in an ideal, then find fault with what they have," Magids says. Remind yourself what makes your guy a stud. Whether it's the way he looks just out of bed or how he gets your cup of java right every time, tell him. "If your words and thoughts are positive," Callahan says, "your emotions naturally follow."

Rule #3 Protect your egos

Hollywood life is so unreal that it's usually safe-and fun-fantasy territory. That said... "Some people can't handle it," Callahan says. Gritty details might be especially unwelcome. If his Salma Hayek obsession bugs you, tell him you understand that he appreciates gorgeous women but to spare you the play-by-play. Likewise, if he's sick of hearing about Brad's kissable pout, zip it. Fantasies should be the fire starter in your relationship, not the wet blanket that
